New Rate Design to Protect Members

ver the past few months, Farmers' Electric has been working to develop rate changes necessary to address revenues lost from members who choose to install Distributed Generation (DG), including solar panels and small wind machines. In some examples, members are able to completely offset their monthly energy purchases from the Cooperative, providing minimal financial support for the ongoing construction, operation and maintenance of the Cooperative's electric system. Across the Cooperative's service

area, the cost of maintaining and replacing aging infrastructure is an ever-increasing expense.

It is important that the Cooperative move forward with rate changes now, while the number of members impacted are relatively small. As the Cooperative considered various rate options, the Board of Trustees wanted to explore rate design that would allow members to continue to reduce their monthly electric bill through net metering and avoid wholesale power generation and transmission costs. Just as important, the Board wanted a rate design to protect other members from shouldering a disproportionate share of the cost to construct, operate, and maintain the Cooperative's electric system.

For Farmers' Electric, the cost to serve a member can be separated into two distinct categories:

- 1. Wholesale Power expense, including power plants, fuel to generate electricity, and bulk transmission system; and
- 2. Farmers' Electric system expense, including construction, operation, and maintenance of the Cooperative's electric system.

When a member installs DG Farmers' Electric does experience a reduction in wholesale power expense; however, DG does not reduce any of the costs to operate the Farmers' Electric system. Farmers' has identified that the "average" cost to serve a residential member is \$57.36 per month. For members with DG the Cooperative spends an additional \$8.49 each month to read and calculate the bi-directional meter data for net-metering, for a total base cost of \$65.85 per month for the average residential member with DG. Farmers' current base Customer Charge for residential members is \$17.50 per month. Historically, the Cooperative has relied on revenues from kilowatt-hour sales to recover the difference between the base cost to serve each member and the base Customer Charge.

Farmers' proposed rate change would increase the Customer Charge for all residential members to \$20.00 per month. For members with DG, Farmers' proposes an additional monthly service charge of \$8.49, to recover the extra cost involved in reading and calculating the bi-directional meter data for net-metering, a total of \$28.49 per month.

In addition, each DG account will be charged \$5.72 per kW per month of installed DG system capacity. As an example, the monthly base charges would be calculated as:

DG System Size	Customer Charge	Facility Charge	Total Base Charge
3kW DG	\$28.49	\$17.16	\$45.65
6kW DG	\$28.49	\$34.32	\$62.81
10kW DG	\$28.49	\$57.20	\$85.69

The DG Facilities Charge varies with the size of the DG system installed and is designed to mirror the portion of the Cooperative's electric system the member is relying on at times when the DG system is not providing sufficient energy such as night, weather conditions, etc. Any kilowatt-hours consumed in the month will continue to be billed under the residential rate schedule, including any discounts for electric water heating and space heating.

Farmers' Electric recognizes that some members have already made significant investment in DG; therefore, for a period of five years from the date the Board of Trustees approved the change, May 24, 2019, the Cooperative will "grandfather" members who currently have DG and not impose the DG Facilities Charge of \$5.72 per kW of installed DG capacity per month. Members with DG would be charged the Customer Charge of \$20.00. plus \$8.49 for meter reading and billing for net-metering, a total of \$28.49 per month plus a charge for any energy used in the month.

Changes in rates to accommodate DG are also proposed for the Irrigation, Small Commercial, Power Service and Industrial rate classes.

SWIMMING POOL SAFETY

- Make sure that any lighting equipment in your pool is up to code and regularly examined by a professional.
 To change or repair a light, ensure the electricity to the pool is first turned off at the circuit breaker.
- If you are in the water and feel electric current, which can cause a tingling sensation, shout to let others know, try to stay upright, tuck your legs up to make yourself smaller, and swim away from anything that could be energized. *Do not use a metal ladder to exit the pool.*
- Remember, water and electricity are a dangerous mix, even outside the pool. Never touch any electrical appliances or outlets when you are wet or standing in water.
